They all got a little bit wet in a fun Maths lesson learning about capacity and volume.






LONG LIVE KING CHARLES!

This weekend, King Charles III was royally coronated at Westminster Abbey alongside his wife, Camilla, cementing both as King & Queen of the UK and giving us a look into the well-preserved traditions of the ceremony.

The day after the tragic passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the United Kingdom and her associated Commonwealth nations released statements appointing Charles III as the successor to the British throne. However, the coronation ceremony would not be held until months later on May 6th.

Over 2000 people were invited to view His Majesty's appointment including religious figures, Commonwealth leaders as well as many abbots, bishops, archbishops and heralds. Uniquely, faith representatives from other religions were invited to show up as well to represent the diverse multicultural identity the nation had acquired since the coronation held previously.

During the coronation, His Majesty made the coronation oath first, firmly swearing to rule each of his countries accordingly and to withhold their customs with mercy. After, he was seated on the coronation chair where he would remove his robe and be anointed with holy oil. After this, he was invested in many possessions of the coronation regalia, including the Imperial State Crown.

People across the world were able to view the coronation on behalf of the BBC and rejoiced at His Majesty's formal crowning, however others viewed the event with contempt. Particularly, the Cullinan diamonds included in the Sovereign's Sceptre and State Crown have endured criticism from skeptics in South Africa, viewing these as leftovers from a terrible colonial past. May his Majesty and his associates have the utmost best of success as King of England. God Save the King!


The British royal family

Members:

The core of the royal family is made up of King Charles III and Queen Camilla; William, Prince of Wales and Catherine, Princess of Wales; Anne, Princess Royal; and Prince Edward, Duke of Edinburgh and Sophie, Duchess of Edinburgh. They carry out royal duties full-time.

Lower profile relatives who perform some duties are Prince Richard, Duke of Gloucester and Birgitte, Duchess of Gloucester; Prince Edward, Duke of Kent; and Princess Alexandra, The Hon. Lady Ogilvy.

Other members of the royal family with royal rank who do not carry out official duties are Prince George, Princess Charlotte, and Prince Louis of Wales; Prince Harry, Duke of Sussex and Meghan, Duchess of Sussex, Prince Archie and Princess Lilibet of Sussex; Prince Andrew, Duke of York; Princess Beatrice; Princess Eugenie; Katharine, Duchess of Kent; and Prince and Princess Michael of Kent.



Coronation:

Charles III and his wife Camilla were crowned king and queen of the UK and Commonwealth on 6 May 2023, following the death of Elizabeth II.



Buckingham Palace

Buckingham Palace has been the rulers of the UK since 1837 and serves as the Monarch's administrative center. It has 775 rooms, 92 offices, 78 baths, 188 servant bedrooms, 52 royal and guest bedrooms, and 19 state rooms. It is 24 meters high, 120 meters deep, and 108 meters long.



Royal pets:

Queen Elizabeth II was well known for her love of dogs, and corgis have become an internationally recognized symbol of her reign. This follows a long tradition of the royal family keeping dogs for their companionship, setting a precedent for Britain to become a nation of animal lovers.

Elizabeth II:

Elizabeth II was Queen of the UK and Commonwealth from 1952 to 2022, reigning for 70 years and 214 days. She was queen regnant of 32 sovereign states and head of state of 15 realms at her death. Her reign was the longest of any British monarch and the longest verified reign of any female head of state in history.


